Costs: Registration cost is Can\$100.

Contrary to what is on the Website, payment in Canadian dollars *is* acceptable. Credit Card payment is not available so it has to be Money Order or Bank draft. Please do this yourself.

Getting there:

Flight Centre were recently advertising Flights to Vancouver at an early special of **\$1735 return**, in the 'window' of the Conference dates and they won't come cheaper than that! The most convenient way to fly is direct from Auckland to Vancouver. Then it is a short domestic flight to Kelowna, or 3 hours by Greyhound Bus.



For *travel booking* the Conference begins with checking in on the afternoon of Monday 21 June. Thus if you were to leave NZ and fly to Vancouver and direct this would need to be Sunday 20 June departing 8pm arriving 2.15pm (20<sup>th</sup>), as there's no direct flight on 21 June. The programme begins with the opening service at 7pm on 21<sup>st</sup>. The Conference ends on the evening of Friday 25<sup>th</sup> with a final service. People will normally leave after breakfast on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup>. Details of the *speakers and programme* as available so far can be found on the Website.

## **About Hospital Chaplaincy**

Hospital Chaplaincy is a rewarding vocation, one that's very different from parish ministry – although that too is rewarding, but in a very different manner. In a hospital most of your time is spent dealing with the sick, or the dying, so it brings a unique perspective to ministry. Of course there are many happy occasions, such as the birth of a new baby, and the joy on the parents' faces. And of course the times when people having spent time in hospital are now well enough to return home, and share with you how much they're looking forward to that.

Generally speaking, the majority of folk in hospital are unwell or suffering in some way, or either facing or recovering from an operation. So there is the old age question, with which I'm often faced, "Why me?"; or why my spouse, best friend or child? Chaplains do spend their day, not just with 'believers' but with a wide range of people, many who are skeptical, many who "used to go to church" and many more for whom God and church seem irrelevant. So we become the listening ear, the compassionate heart and agents of God's love. This is something I am acutely aware of as I walk around the wards and sit with people; I'm there as a representative of Christ, the One who is the Great Physician. It is always such a privilege to pray with patients and listen to their stories – and I could count on one hand those who over the years have not wanted to see the Chaplain!

On 4<sup>th</sup> June we had the Dedication and Opening of the new Chapel at Wairau Hospital, the first chapel we've had in the nine years I've been Chaplain, so it was a very special occasion and now provides what I called at the opening, "the Spiritual heart" to the hospital; a place for patients, families, whanau and staff to come; a place to pray, to sit and relax, to reflect and worship, as well as providing a unique centre for the Chaplaincy team to work from.

Please continue to uphold all Chaplains in their ministry, as they reach out to those in situations of deep need or crises, and as they help to bring the healing love of Jesus to all in need. **Revd Kevin Gwynne, Missioner**

## Some Testimonies:

### ANSWER TO PERSISTENT PRAYER

A healing after fifteen long, weary years has been our amazing experience this year. Our son Richard was a fit young man of 23 when the devastating effects of chronic fatigue syndrome (CFS) cut him down, leaving him bed bound and needing full care for 13 of those years. So many individuals, congregations and Christian groups including OSL, prayed faithfully year after year for Richard.



During those long hard years it was interesting to note how God raised up new people to bear the load of ministering to us as a family with prayer, friendship, letters, phone messages, food, love gifts, funny cards, even money to pay for yet another therapy was all lovingly given.

During 2008 a Christian friend sent us a book about a method that has helped many people with CFS and with some scepticism we read the book, *"The Lightning Process"* by Phil Parker. As we read, many strands of prayer, hope and love began to converge, I believe, at this time.

**First**, the various prayer chains, congregations and individuals we enjoyed contact with were galvanised to pray and claim a healing breakthrough in the authority of the name of Jesus Christ.

**Secondly**, I had a dream one night that I was at the table waiting to be served a meal when a plate came down to my place which said "your heart's desire has been granted".

**Thirdly**, the home group to which we belonged were studying the readings set down for the coming Sunday (which was the day Richard was to begin his seminar to learn the *Lightning Process*) and these readings were duly discussed but for me each reading jumped out and shouted at me!

***"The Lord says do not cling to events of the past or dwell on what happened long ago, watch for the new thing I am going to do. It is happening already; you can see it now"*** Isaiah 43:18...

And from Mark 2 we read the story of the paralysed man who was brought to Jesus by friends and was lowered down through the roof. Mark 2:1-12

The day arrived and Richard was taught a technique which he could immediately implement. He now had a weapon, a tool to use against the insidious symptoms of CFS. Instead of lying there frustrated, angry and hopeless he was proud, fierce and challenged. He had hope, once again! God had indeed delivered my hearts desire; Richard was able to look forward now and thanks to his 'friends' he was already beginning the healing process. Six months later Richard is out and about, driving, socialising and getting his life back on track, because once again, he has a life worth living. We give God praise and thanks for the many faithful prayers over the years and for our son 's healing. **Gill & Max Cranch**

During this winter, our Vicar and his wife, the Revd Ian & Helen Hardcastle, have been conducting a series of Prayer Ministry trainings once a month. These have proved invaluable for newcomers to this ministry and even more so to some 5 or 6 of us "old-hands", members of Hibiscus Coast Chapter of OSL. The teachings are based on the John Wimber practices. One of the big pluses on this course is the hands-on experience it gives, and over the four sessions so far, we have seen more than a dozen healings or partial healings.

My own experience happened recently when four of us looked at one another when our leader asked, "who would like prayer for healing?" Initially there were no takers, then I volunteered!

As a 17 year old, I had suffered a bad fall while mountain climbing at Mt Ruapehu, breaking my back. Then two strokes in my 50's and I was relying on my walking stick, especially climbing the steps to the altar rail at St Stephens. So prayer ministry began with our small group seeking the Holy Spirit's guidance in prayer. I suddenly felt my spine move like a snake and Janice whose hand was on my back felt it too! I cried out and stood up, and up, AND UP! WOW no pain and I was straighter than I had been in 50 years! Two weeks later I don't use my stick, I am still "straight", and am I praising my Lord!!

### **A Sharing Testimony**

*With Editor's 'licence' I copy this testimony as if it were my own; I too have had similar healings in my soul, and I'm certain many others also.*

"I never thought I'd live my life looking forward to Thursday so much. (It is our mid-week Communion service.) One particular morning recently, my heart and mind were particularly attuned to the Spirit's presence. As I closed my eyes to pray (at the altar rail) I was drawn back to that upper room where Christ began it all. . . the bread, broken and shared, the wine, drunk from the common cup. The lamps burning down, the room dimly lit as the wicks send up trails of smoke. It is very late; He is tired and bids them (and us), "remember me". "Each time I kneel at the altar-rail for healing prayer I feel a warmth and strength emanating from the hands of the one chosen to be the vessel of God's healing that day."

As we process to the altar each Thursday morning, I think of this as a time and place for receiving Jesus in the sacrament of His Body and Blood as also receiving His Healing. Reflect on the words, "this is my body given for you; this is blood, shed for you; keep you in eternal life." Or as was formally said, "Preserve (*heal*) your body and soul." I return to the pew and kneel, pray, cry (maybe laugh and sing in pure joy) in thanksgiving and praise for Christ's healing. "What more could anyone wish for?"
