Greetings from National Chaplain Lionel

Dear Friends,

Rachelle and I have recently returned home from three weeks in the North Island. During this time we attended the Executive Meeting as well as visiting chapters and churches in Marlborough, Waikato, Taranaki, Whanganui, Manawatu and Wairarapa. We are grateful for the warm hospitality we received wherever we went. Also we enjoyed the mild autumn weather arriving home before the winter really set in. We made significant contact with churches that are exploring the healing ministry but have little or no contact with OSL. We were greatly encouraged by these contacts and were able to tell them about OSL and possibilities for their churches.

During this trip we also made contact with a number of postal members to give them encouragement in their situation. Postal members account for about one third of our membership and often have a lonely road to travel. I suspect too, that some postal members can at times feel forgotten by the wider OSL. I want to encourage all postal members, wherever you are, because I believe you have a vital role to play in the healing ministry. First and foremost you can exercise a prayer ministry right where you are. I know that some of you are doing this already. You can encourage others in your church community (including your church leaders) to consider the place Christian healing has in the church. Also you could take the initiative and introduce others to the Wholeness magazine.

While we were in Hamilton we were pleased to have lunch with the Editor of the Wholeness magazine, Michael Ferri, and his wife Malia. They are very committed to the healing ministry. I would encourage all OSL members to support Michael and Wholeness with your prayers. Also remember that this ministry is also dependent on donations from chapters, churches and interested people.

A week later the woman was discharged from the mental institution. Her heart was full of the love of God. – ends quote from AMAZING LOVE.

I prayed that prayer myself -- it has a universal application – then switched out the light, knowing that healing of people with these inner or mental sicknesses is in the Hands of our Lord Jesus.

And, while I think about it, Corrie ten Boom has a great teaching from her experiences in that concentration camp on forgiveness. When we meet someone who has suffered hatred like these women did at the hands of someone who comes asking for forgiveness, how can we forgive them?

Forgiving someone who tortured you cannot be easy. Read (or re-read) the last half dozen pages in **"The Hiding Place"**, reflect upon them, pray, seek God. You will find you can love and forgive; and be loved and forgiven.

The same procedure followed with my left ear, again with the same question and reply, only this time I saw he had stepped back from me as he answered in a **very** quiet voice.



Well, what rejoicing and thanksgiving followed!

As I was going back to my seat Bruce spoke out from where he was ministering to another further along the row. “I believe God is going to use that lady to bring healing of deafness in many other folk.” After that I did hear every word of teaching given by Bruce! AND . . . what a mighty God we have with us wherever we go in his service. His prophetic word has happened in my church and in two OSL groups I have visited since. Therefore,

From under the Editor’s Pillow

We had been watching some TV “misery” and saw an advert for depression featuring a famous All Black. Added to this two recent *LISTENER* magazines with cover featured articles on “Anxiety” and “Drinking and Depression” (dates 19 June & 26 June resp) you might think we watch the wrong programmes, read the wrong books and magazines! But the truth is that our communities are rife with problems of drugs and alcohol and these related illnesses. Concerned how we pray for this situation, I picked up a book (I believe God led me) to read, Corrie ten Boom’s little book of 1953, ***“Amazing Love”***.

Page 68 begins with a quotation:

“God is willing to enter into the heart, as light is willing to flood a room that is opened to its brightness.”

We read down the page of a woman who had been in a bomb attack that killed her husband. When she regained consciousness and saw her husband lying dead, she opened her heart to hatred. She hated those who had perpetrated the deadly attack. She had become a complete wreck. Poor woman! Corrie was asked to visit her in a mental institution.

Quote:-

“As I entered the room she looked suspiciously at me. I prayed for wisdom and love.

“I know exactly what you’re going to tell me, I must pray,” she began in a defiant manner. “But I cannot pray.” I made no reply, as she continued, “I know exactly what you’ll say next; that I must banish the hatred from my heart, because only then can I pray again.”

“Who told you that?”

“The chaplain.”

The conversation goes on with Corrie describing to her how she suffered, not because she herself was treated so cruelly in the concentration camp, but at the way the guards beat up her sister because she was too weak to shovel sand. Then, hatred tried to enter her heart.

“Then I experienced a miracle. Jesus had planted His love in my heart, and there was no room left in my heart for hatred. The only thing you can do is to open your heart to His love. That love is a reality. . . . I merely have to draw the curtains aside, and as soon as the sunlight floods the room the darkness vanishes.”

We both knelt down, and I prayed,

“Lord, here we are, weak, much weaker than the devil of hatred. But You are stronger than the devil of hatred, and now we open our hearts to You,

In Taranaki we visited the Manna Healing Centre at Oakura (near New Plymouth). It was great to have time with Olive and Ian Carter (the managers) as well as the assistant managers and staff. This gave us the opportunity to learn something of the ministry they are involved in with its joys and challenges. Please remember in your prayers, not only the Manna Healing Centre, but also Titoki and Te Waiora. These are often places of refuge and renewal for people bearing heavy burdens.

As I write this it is only 10 days before we leave for the International Conference in Canada from 21 - 26 June. There are eleven New Zealanders who are attending. We will be actively promoting the next International Conference which we will be hosting at Totara Springs, Matamata in October 2013. We look forward to reporting back to you in the next copy of Heal Link..

From the Editor

I have received a letter from Jean in which she reminds us of a very important part to the ministry of healing. We do not have the space to include all Jean has written but I think this bit is very important.

“It is very easy for a person who has received Christ's authority to heal (that is us all) to say ‘I have prayed for you, now you are healed.’ and leave our ministry at that.” Jean writes that this happened to her once but fortunately she went to her GP asking to come off her medication because she had been healed. But her wise doctor warned her not to stop her medicines but slowly reduce the level of medication under a GP's supervision.

Jean quotes two cases of folk who suffered, one epilepsy the other diabetes, who received healing for their diseases and disabilities and in their faith, feeling and believing they were healed. In truth, their physical bodies were different and having stopped daily medication the outcome was a serious setback. Remember,

1. In prayer ministry, first always ask the person what they want Jesus to do for them.
2. Ask God how to pray for this person. Ask and Listen!
3. Seek the leading Holy Spirit will bring to you and the other(s).
“Come Holy Spirit, come.” Allow plenty of time for this to happen!
4. As you pray, ask the one being prayed for, how do you feel.
5. Keep praying and seeking the Holy Spirit. Repeat item 4.
6. Give thanks to the Lord.

Giving thanks can often be sharing their healing with others, prayer and laying hands on others. Remind them to check with their doctor, especially if the person is on medication. Don't assume everyone know this!!!
