Greetings from National Chaplain Lionel

Dear Friends,

When I last wrote Rachelle and I were preparing to attend the International Conference in Canada. The Conference is now a memory, but what a wonderful memory! It was great to be able to worship together and have fellowship with OSL members from other countries and church traditions. There were about 260 people present coming from Canada, USA, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands, Australia and New Zealand. A number of these we had met in Melbourne in 2002. Our NZ contingent of 11 was made to feel very welcome and many people commented that we had travelled so far to be there. One man said to me that he had never met anyone from so far away! I went to six of the workshops and found each one valuable. The workshop that Derek led on 'Creative Liturgy' was very good and evoked a good response from those attending. I attended the meeting of International OSL leaders. This was a good chance to meet some of the other leaders and to discuss matters of common interest. One thing that became clear to me from this meeting was that the Order of St Luke throughout the world is facing a diminishing membership and is needing to look at the question of relevance in the 21st century. The healing ministry is still needed. Indeed more people are seeking healing but they are not necessarily looking for it in traditional organisations. One thing is clear we need to keep focused on Jesus Christ and seek to hear what he is saying to us in 2010. This conference was a stimulating and challenging event. Of course we took every opportunity to promote the next International Conference which we will be hosting at Totara Springs, Matamata in 2013.

However, before that we have our own Triennial Conference at Totara Springs from **Monday October 17 to Thursday 20** next year. This is going to be an extra special conference as we will be celebrating 50 years of OSL in NZ. I urge you to

Report on the International Conference

Impressions (from Derek Lightbourne)

There's a song which begins 'There's a quiet understanding when we gather in the presence of the Lord...' likewise when members across a number of countries gather sharing a conviction of Jesus' healing today. Also there is empathy across denominations, and indeed I met a person from the Church of the Nazarene. The Okanagan Valley where the Conference was held could be called the fruit-bowl of British Columbia, and the early season cherries and strawberries were delicious. For me, the mark of the Conference was the friendliness of those gathered. New friends were made and from this we are exploring the idea of Chapter partnerships between North America and New Zealand. From this it is hoped there will be mutual prayer, periodic contact and meeting up when we host the International Conference in 2013. My hope is that the Conference may 'continue' with our overseas visitors meeting OSL Chapters in various parts of the country after the gathering in Matamata. We had a NZ Display for 2013 and from this some 250 Leaflets were taken.

I asked our NZ attendees what were the highlights for them. As well as what is already mentioned we were blessed with some seven keynote speakers. The North American Director Larry Mitchell gave a stirring opening to the Conference with the challenge for us to 'open our eyes' to see and believe what Jesus is doing in healing and bringing people to wholeness. It was a reminder of that verse in Ephesians: 'Now to God who



is able to do immeasurably more than we can ask or conceive, by the power that is at work among us....' Our National Chaplain Lionel spoke very well on Sharing the Heart of Jesus in a culture of blame. He drew from recent tragedies of Sophie Elliott's death, and the Christian students' deaths in a flash flood. He contrasted the two and pointed especially to the Christian imperative of forgiveness which was evident in the inquiries which followed.

All participants had opportunity to attend some 6 of 12 workshops, and there were prayer group times, and ministry after keynote speakers. A feature of the informal times was a 'Canadian evening', with lots tapping their toes along with the music of a country bluegrass band. Much is to be gained from meeting and sharing with others in the Order and I'm sure each of the 11 New Zealanders attending came back with good ideas to bring to Chapters along with important teaching. So – ask someone who attended to speak to your chapter.

International Conference OSL 2010 (Rachelle Brown)

This was a wonderful experience of learning and sharing together different aspects of Jesus' healing ministry. The theme 'Sharing the Heart of Jesus' was dealt with by seven different speakers in a variety of very practical ways:

- A reflection of the heart of Jesus
- Healing the wounds from a church's past
- Hospital visiting and follow up
- Kingdom healing
- Ministry to the dying and bereaved
- Sharing Jesus in a culture of blame
- The heart of Jesus is bigger than we think.



Throughout conference we were able to choose to attend six workshops out of twelve. Most of those I attended proved to be practical, enlightening and worthwhile.

The warmth and friendliness of the 'locals' (Canadians and Americans) was especially noteworthy and when they realised we were from New Zealand they made an even greater fuss over us. This bodes well for the next International Conference being held here in NZ in 2013!!

Evening meals (part of a package deal) were fantastic and a great time to connect with different people.

I have to say that the evening set aside for relaxation was brilliant. It was a 'Western Night' and many locals were dressed for the occasion. There was great entertainment from a local bluegrass band (including some young children for the first half) and the fun of getting up to dance even if one is not an expert, was liberating and refreshing. I believe that Jesus was sharing his heart with us that evening in yet another way.

Small prayer groups gave us yet another opportunity to share in a deeper way with others at the conference.

It was great to see Derek Lightbourne included in the music team leading worship and John Jones taking part in the choir. Derek also conducted a workshop on 'Creative Liturgy'. Lionel was one of the speakers and received a standing ovation along with two of the other six speakers. Several of us were invited to take part in the healing ministry following the evening messages. Altogether it was a very inspiring and worthwhile time of learning, practicing and fellowship.

start preparing now to be at that conference. This will be an opportunity to give thanks for what OSL has meant to so many people over the past 50 years.
