Dear Friends,

I am pleased to be able to write a greeting for this Heal Link issue number 300. It is good to reflect on the impact that Heal Link has made on OSL members over the years. Heal Link is more than a newsletter keeping members up to date with OSL happenings. It is also a means of encouragement by sharing testimonies of answers to prayer. I know that the present editor sees this function of Heal Link as very important. So I ask you to keep on sending in those testimonies for the encouragement of us all. We can give thanks to God for those who have contributed to Heal Link and those who have edited it over the years. If we could list everyone it would be a most impressive roll of honour.

As you all know we have been through a major earthquake here in Christchurch. It was certainly far greater than any I have experienced and the aftershocks have not helped. Three weeks later we are still receiving the odd shock. The news media has certainly had a field day showing many graphic images. I am sure that many of you imagined that we were all sitting in a pile of rubble!! Personally we have been very fortunate and suffered very little damage. We did not even lose the power or water. Our hot water cylinder developed a leak but that was soon fixed. Unfortunately Te Waiora House was badly damaged with falling chimneys. The chapel however was undamaged and there were no injuries. Many of you will know that John and Enid McLean are the present Chaplain/House Managers. Please pray for them and the Te Waiora Trust Board during this difficult time. John and Enid live in a very comfortable cottage at Te

Waiora and that suffered little damage apart from the hot water cylinder. Their greatest regret is that they are unable to take any guests at Te Waiora for the foreseeable future. We are planning an Area Day for Canterbury for October 16th. We will be using the Te Waiora Chapel and the grounds.

With no loss of life and very few major injuries we can truly give thanks to God that the earthquake occurred at a time when very few people were out and about. There have been a good number of reports of people who have had near misses as bricks have come tumbling down. Thank you for your prayers. Please continue to pray especially for those people whose homes have been badly damaged and are still unsure as to whether they will need to be demolished. There are also some who do not yet know whether they will be able to rebuild on their present site. These are the people who need much support. Pray too that many will turn to God in thanksgiving for his many mercies and place their trust in him for the future.



The other important matter is one which I mentioned last month. That is the need for a new General Secretary. This has become especially important with the election of Brian Flower as the next National Chaplain. I would ask you to pray earnestly about this matter and seek God's will. Is he asking you to consider this ministry? Or is he bringing to mind some one who you could ask to consider it? The role of General Secretary is a most important one for the life of the Order and so I would urge you to keep the matter in your prayers. Do not hesitate to contact me if you want to make a tentative enquiry or a suggestion.



This Issue 300 of Heal Link also marks the beginning of our 50 year celebration as OSL in New Zealand. We encourage chapters and areas to mark this with special events over the next two years. Anne & Pat Clinch send their blessings:

"It was awesome when I was baptised in the Holy Spirit on 6th July 1991. For nine years I had been suffering from manic depression (now called bi-polar) but even though I had been filled with the Holy Spirit I was not healed. This disorder is characterised by alternating swings in mood - from extreme highs to deep lows; it was horrible. In early 1993 we were part of a healing team that had just been formed in our Anglican church.

The Lord put it upon our hearts to visit the healing ministry teams in the Anglican Cathedrals in Melbourne and Sydney. We went in May 1993, the Lord having supplied the finance. We saw how these teams operated and in Sydney we met the Team Leader, Canon Jim Holbeck who had taken over from Canon Jim Glennon, and Team Secretary Mary Vercoe.

Three months after we returned from Aussie, I had an extreme low and asked Anne - my wife - to phone Mary and get them to pray for me. It was just before their weekly healing service and Mary promised to put my name forward for prayer. That evening I was feeling better, and next day the depression had completely lifted. The Lord is awesome! We wrote and told them of my healing. Then in 2001 when we next visited Sydney we went to their healing service and Canon Holbeck asked me to testify to the congregation of my healing. After the service a couple of people thanked me for the testimony saying that it gave them hope.



We have found that the Lord often leads us into new situations, in this case showing us that prayers "over the airways" are effective in providing healing ministry."

WHAT OSL MEANS TO ME

I was welcomed into this group of loving, caring and accepting Christians who brought amazing solace to my heart and to an awareness of Christ's body on earth where all denominational labels fell away as we met in Jesus' love and the unity of the Holy Spirit. It was not long before Jean got me involved in committees and conferences, all of which widened my spiritual and Christian horizons. I learnt about praying and interceding for others and about the importance of being in right standing before God as Father and the constant need for forgiveness in my life, to be a clear channel for God's Spirit to flow out to others. I also discovered that to be able to forgive those who had hurt me, was a key to finding one's own healing of spirit, soul and body.

I am very grateful to God for the wonderful fellowship, encouragement, teaching and healing I have received over 34 years from many people, both in chapter meetings, area seminars, and in the conferences.

Thank you, Father for all involved in your healing ministry, through your Son, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Marcelle Chambers shares some early days of OSLNZ

I would like to give thanks to God for His leading and guiding in my journey in the healing ministry through my association with the Order of St Luke through the Order's history of almost 50 years in NZ.

For me it commenced when the Lord led my husband Jim into the conviction that Jesus still heals today when I received healing in 1956 from constant headaches due to a head injury. This led Jim to seek fellow believers both here and overseas, which then led into contact with the Order of St Luke in Australia, and this eventually helped to form the first committee and officers of the first chapters in NZ.



In the beginning Jim and others were invited to conduct missions from whence chapters were formed. Later I was privileged to accompany Jim and led to also be used in praying for and laying hands on others. And in those early years, while Jim was minister at the Congregational church in Wellington, this was the venue for successive Wardens' Councils and we had real pleasure of hosting many overseas speakers of international fame.

Without going into too much history, which has been and is yet to be recorded, I give thanks to God for the wonderful opportunities He has given to our service in this ministry:

for the support and friendships made, some I still enjoy today;
for hospitality of people during travel and missions;
for teaching and learning received from many avenues;
for opportunities of ministering in many countries overseas;
for health and strength I still enjoy through God's enabling,
and to continue to be used in His service today.

Do join with me in praising God for the many lives he has touched and empowered by our Healing Christ, who is the same yesterday, today and forever. Let us be passionate as we go into the future for this Good News and work diligently and prayerfully to spread it in this needy world.

HOW I DISCOVERED THE HEALING MINISTRY

As a Christian teenager, I eagerly devoured the Bible and sat under good church teaching. But positive prayer for healing didn't seem to be part of that teaching. My mother, when aged around 52 or 53 was diagnosed with bladder cancer. She called for an elder from her Baptist church on the basis of James 5:14. Wyn Fountain, a man later to be prominent in the charismatic renewal, came with words similar to: "We elders don't know anything about this healing business, but if you have some oil, I will do as James instructs." My mother got some kitchen cooking oil, accepted the anointing and cancelled further hospital appointments. She passed into glory aged 97 years. Mum's healing left its indelible impression upon me but for some years after healing was not prominent in my thinking.

Following theological college, I decided to train as a teacher. As a first-year teacher at a North Auckland school, I enabled a farming couple to take a school holiday break by milking their cows. After hosing out the shed after milking I sat down in the corner on a pile of old newspapers. I spotted a coloured pamphlet sticking out from the pile. It was a booklet by the late Rev Dr Jim Chambers on healing. He was then serving the nearby Maungaturoto Congregational Church. I eagerly read that little treatise. As I served the Lord, I began to see Jesus heal. A prayer by a local Christian doctor, called out late at night, resulted in my highly feverish son drop to a normal temperature within minutes – as he slept. I prayed for Mr Brown of Mangawhai, whose gangrenous leg was to be amputated the next day. But the hospital saw change and cancelled the operation. Mr Brown lived on for some years. A personal healing occurred when Bill Subritzky prayed for "someone's right hand". My right hand had tendons severed in an accident so I was unable to grip for many years - until Bill Subritzky prayed that night.

Having trained as a Congregational minister, I was ordained by Dr Jim Chambers in 1983 to serve a Baptist church. That task included the healing work of Jesus. Yes, we saw amazing healings. One vital ministry was introducing Jesus to homosexuals and lesbians who wanted release. My wife Rosemary was given hours to live after a serious cancer operation, but we had her for 22 months. We even had a medically verified 'raising from the dead' – a lady who died and through the ministry of a prophetic man attending the meeting was raised to life. To all who read this abbreviated testimony: "Jesus heals today! Praise Him."

PERSONAL HEALINGS

I have had several notable healings during my lifetime, but the most visible and undeniable one occurred when I was about 34 years old.

It was our custom to accompany the young people of our church, which included anywhere from 2-4 of our own, on the annual spring break ski trip to Colorado or New Mexico. On this particular occasion, we travelled to Taos, New Mexico. On the second day of the ski trip, when we arrived at the ski slope, it was snowing and the winds were so high that they wouldn't open the lifts. We formed a large circle and holding hands prayed that the winds would die down enough for the lifts to become operational, which happened shortly after we prayed.

My first run down the slope resulted in disaster for me. I was skiing parallel, down the slope, and was barely moving because of the force of the head wind. When I approached the end where the slope made a u-turn, I hit solid ice, as the wind had swept all the powder off, leaving only the ice surface. My legs were not strong enough to stay together and split outwards. I heard the ligaments in my left leg tear and I was brought down from the slope in a sled pulled by an expert skier. When my leg was examined in the first aid hut, it had absolute instability. The Doctor could waggle the bottom part of my leg back and forth and spread it at the knee. Our Associate Minister, Claude Hargis prayed for my knee on the slope before I went into a clinic in Taos, where they wrapped the knee and gave me crutches to get around on.

When we arrived back home in Oklahoma, my husband took me to The Bone and Joint Clinic in Oklahoma City to see Dr Bell. He said that after 3 days (it had been 5 days) the ligaments became so soft and spongy that they would not hold a suture so my choices were:

- (1) Have my leg casted, wait 10 weeks, have surgery and then spend another 10 weeks in a cast or
- (2) Have surgery and spend 10 weeks in a cast and mostly have surgery again and spend another 10 weeks in a cast. This was a gloomy prospect with 5 kids and a husband at home! I chose the first option.

At the end of the 10 weeks when the doctor removed the cast, my knee was just fine, only stiff from 10 weeks in a cast. It has never given me any trouble since. Praise to JEHOVAH JIREH !
