Greetings from National Chaplain Lionel



Dear Friends,

New Years greetings to you all! The last few months have been rather challenging in many ways. For those of us living in Canterbury the earthquake of September 4 and the subsequent aftershocks are presenting both challenges and opportunities. There are a good number of people who are still very stressed out. Some are still sleeping under a table. Fear is very real and there are many who need to hear and take to heart the words of Jesus to the disciples in the storm:

"Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." [Mark 6 : 50]

Christians have an opportunity here to say a word in season.

In recent weeks the floods in Australia have caught our attention. We have had floods in parts of NZ too but not on the scale of those in Australia. Please continue to pray for those who are facing all sorts of trauma including the death of loved ones. Remember too our OSL brothers and sisters in the midst of all this.

The Pike River Mine tragedy is still very much in the news. Rachele and I arrived in Greymouth on the day of the second explosion. We had a meeting with the OSL Healing Group that evening. Our OSL chaplain in Greymouth, Derek Cone, is the chaplain to the police and to a number of firms who had men down the mine. As you can imagine he is very involved in the whole situation and continues to value our prayers. Please continue to pray for all involved in making difficult, far reaching decisions and for the leaders of the churches in Greymouth.

On the wider scene, we received an email from the Rev Asaha Udom, Warden for OSL in Nigeria. This email contained disturbing news about

the persecution of Christians in Nigeria. One sentence from his email stands out:

“My Conference Secretary, his wife and 3 of their 5 children were burnt alive inside their house, with all the Conference reports. Please keep us in your prayers.”

Please continue to pray for our brothers and sisters in this horrendous situation. We have a special link with OSL Nigeria as it was our NZ OSL that helped them to get started.



All of these situations have a common thread flowing through them: uncertainty.

- Here in Canterbury there is uncertainty as to when the aftershocks will cease, uncertainty when the next one will come, and for many people, uncertainty when their damaged homes will be restored or rebuilt.
- In Australia there is uncertainty when the flooding will cease and when people will be able to return to their homes.
- In Greymouth there is uncertainty about future employment, uncertainty about whether the mine will ever open and uncertainty as to whether loved ones' remains will ever be retrieved.
- In Nigeria there is uncertainty for Christians as to where persecution will occur next.

Into this world of uncertainty comes the promise of God to his people in exile: *“For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for your harm, to give you a future with hope.*

[Jeremiah 29:11]

and Jesus' parting words to his disciples:

“Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.”

Healings at New Wine 2011

This is my experience of God using me for healing at New Wine in Waikanae in January.

After the keynote address the speaker said, *“we are going to wait on the Lord; not start praying immediately, just wait on the Lord”*.

I was sitting in the front row, doing nothing – and that's hard for me to sit doing nothing. I could not see what was going on behind me. I felt my hands getting hot, so I opened them out in front of me. I could feel my arms but my hands felt like they were someone else's. The speaker then said that some were feeling healing in their hands to be used for healing, and then my lips began to get dry and hot.

The minister then said that some were getting dry lips; he said that those people were getting the gift of the word from God. I was then getting this intense pressure inside me. During the ministry time prayer ministry team were praying for me and afterwards the Lord gave me words for others.

[Looking back at it now I felt as though I was a clay model being worked into any shape. But if you have old or weathered clay it needs water and shaping with the hands for some time and a lot of work to bring it back into a usable piece of clay.]

The Lord gave me four words for different people for healing: someone with a right forearm; another who had head pain for 15 years; and I can't remember the others. After praying with them and watching what the Lord was doing I said to them have you noted any change. All four were healed. After the prayer meeting was over, I asked two of the prayer ministry team to pray for me. They laid hands on my shoulder and prayed. As they prayed I could feel another hand in the middle of my back and the heat was intense. I felt the hand was pushing upwards and I thought I was getting a word of knowledge saying, “It is my hand on you.”

Afterwards I asked them if anyone had laid a hand on my back. No! They had only laid a hand on my shoulder.

From Central Area Convenor [comes this testimony of ministry to prisoners, for which Chapters might pray. Our Auckland Area Chaplain has passed to me letters from a prisoner in Auckland Prison, which I have now passed on to the Prison Chaplain. Without realising the significance of his prayer requests, this man is seeking **healing**, not of his physical body but of his whole body, soul and spirit; "**wholeness**". See day 27 on our Monthly Prayer Calendar; and please do pray for people in prison, on probation, prison guards & enforcement officers – **Ed**]

Recently I was with our prison ministry group and we were worshipping, praying and talking with the prisoners who came to the prison chapel.

During the discussion time I was with a prisoner who (by his own admission) had committed murder. His family example was not good in that he had siblings and at least one parent who had also committed murder.

However God had started to reach out to him in that place and his first steps in response were to come to the chapel. Here he had questions and more questions and we were hard put to keep up with his desire to know more. The final question almost stumped us and it was, "What does God look like?" I was a bit thrown by this and made a quick prayer "What can I tell him Lord?" and God gave this answer for him, "Look in your mirror – you are made in God's image."

This previously violent man has now started an ongoing journey with God and has begun, with God's help, to heal the wounds to his self image that will allow him to break his cycle of violent offending. God's healing power at work in our prisons!

Blenheim-Tasman News

As the Hospital Chaplain I was asked by a nurse to visit an elderly male patient in his late 80's whom she was concerned about. He was restless and anxious and kept telling her he just wanted to die, despite there being no medical diagnoses or reason for this to occur. In fact, he was due to be discharged later in the week. I visited him as requested, and we spent a long time chatting. The man reiterated to me his desire to die, saying he was in pain, and had nothing to live for. In our discussion he told me his sad life history. He divorced after only 2 years of marriage while in his late 20's, and never ever married again. They never had any children – hence he never had grandchildren either, which saddened him. In fact he had no living relatives, and he said, no real friends. His words to me, through his tears were: 'I have no-one who loves me, or cares about me.' He went on to tell me that he had never trained in any job, or had qualifications, and considered himself one of life's failures. We continued our conversation, then I told him that God cared about him, and asked him if he had any faith or belief in God. To which he replied he went to Sunday School as a young boy, but had never had anything to do with the church since then, although he thought there was "a God up there somewhere." As we spoke I asked him again about his wish to die. He replied that's all he wanted, so I asked him if he thought he'd go to heaven when he died – he wasn't sure. This pastoral conversation led to an invitation to know and accept Jesus as his personal Saviour. Then I asked him what else he'd like prayer for, I received the same response, he wanted to die. The gentleman took my hand as I prayed – along the lines that he would be in God's hands, and that the Lord would take him home, if that was His will. He died peacefully in his sleep that evening – knowing the Lord Jesus Christ loved him. The nurses next day, told me they couldn't believe how calm he was following my visit, nor that he had passed away, medically unexpectedly. I told them why! What a privilege to minister in such a situation.
