Greetings everyone from Warden Brian,

Thank you for your prayers and support while Alexis & I have been traveling overseas to the OSL International Conference in Swaneck, UK. We look forward to sharing our experiences with you in the coming months.

In the last **HEAL-LINK** I contributed a happening from my pastoral days called **TRY TEARS**. It was about a young policeman who came to me after experiencing the loss of his wife in a late-night train accident. I cried with him as he told me his story.

Sometimes in my movements around the district, I would see him. Often I would go with my children to the local school and see this widowed officer, a blond-haired child in each hand taking them into the pre-school next to the school. A couple of years went by. One day I was shopping in the local supermarket and I came near to a lady pushing a trolley. She was accompanied by two young children. I noticed the loving way she tended and talked to them. At one point she fussed a little over the girl's hair. Out of nowhere appeared an off-duty policeman. He walked briskly over to me and, with a smile, asked me to come over to the small group of three with the trolley. "Mr Hooper, I'd like you to meet my wife." And he briefly explained to her how he had visited me after he had lost his first wife.

Ecclesiastes contains some wise healing principles. You will recall Chapter 3 with its opposites: "A time to be born and a time to die; a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted etc." There is a time to heal and, a time to build up (v3), a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance..." With that policeman it was a time to weep and mourn with him. And God did a healing work in him. Ecclesiastes 2:26 says: "To the person who pleases Him, God gives wisdom and knowledge and joy..." (Amplified)

Two Testimonies from Tararua

In January 2000, the Lord put it on our hearts to visit a Christian man who was in hospital after a heart attack. He had endured a number of these attacks, and this last one proved nearly fatal. He told us that he was in a very serious situation, because daily ECGs revealed that he could have another heart attack at any time and the doctors told him that there was nothing they could do to save him.

We laid our hands on him and prayed. Next day the doctor went to him with a perplexed look and told him that he couldn't understand it, but the ECG showed there was now nothing wrong with his heart. Now more than seven years later he is still alive and has not had another attack since then.

Greetings to you all.

Thank you all for your prayers while I was in hospital during Jan, Feb and Apr 2007. I was in room 10 with four others when one was discharged. At five o'clock that night we were told we were to move to another room and I ended up in room 7 with one other. By daybreak the room was full. Two days later one guy picked up his guitar and went walk about. A few minutes later I decided to find out where he had gone to. The person opposite me missed my presence and decided to find out where I had gone to. Three of us were in the lounge when a lady came in (she was from the Cook Islands) and from room 12.

We started to SING AND PRAISE THE LORD. After a while we stopped and introduced ourselves then returned to our singing. When we started back to our beds, we found the Ward doors were locked!! The Bell was pushed and a nurse soon had us back inside. In the morning the person next to me asked, "Did you hear that music last night? It was beautiful!" So I told him the story and he said that if his wife had been here she would have joined us. We were four Christians in a room of 5 patients! During the day and night when a bag is getting empty, the timer makes a loud noise "bing, bing, bong". I commented on this and the nurse responded, "Just make up words to go with it." So we sang: "Jesus is Lord; Jesus loves me; Jesus heals me." EVERYONE LIKED TO WORK IN ROOM SEVEN.

Report from Warden Brian on 3rd International OSL Conference

Greetings and Blessings to everyone;

As you know, I and a group of New Zealand members attended the International Conference in England. Alexis and I were truly blessed and challenged. I had the privilege of giving the closing address – my subject being "Jesus, the Servant King." All the speakers during the week before me were the best one could hear anywhere. I have a set of DVD and CD recordings of the messages and will co-ordinate with our General Secretaries to arrange that they be available to Chapters.

When the Wardens met to discuss the next International Conference, two important decisions were made: Firstly, the next would be in Canada (2010), then New Zealand (2013) and Holland (2016). Secondly, they would be three years apart rather than five. All Wardens noted the special bonding that takes place in an international setting – and recognised the need to meet more frequently as we are a world-wide family.

If I were to give a few impressions of Conference I would say:

- (1) There is a tremendous desire to reach out to the disadvantaged spiritually and bodily. Prayer for people and counselling is increasingly used.
- (2) There are many effective ministries of healing being established by church and OSL people. One 'clinic' has a staff of 30 and is open day and night to passers-by. The clinic is in a shop within a commercial area.
- (3) Which leads me to observe that OSL people generally feel that OSL has a responsibility to establish healing 'clinics' and bring the healing ministry to the person 'in the street'. While there is great value in the 'retreat' type homes that we know of and support in New Zealand, there are more of the 'prayer and counselling centre' types being established in the busy market-places. And healing for 'spirit, soul and body' is sought.

Food for thought!

RESOURCES: *New Study or Reading Material*

For those who have used or read 'Channels of Healing' and 'Searching Questions', there is a new Resource recently become available in the same series: **"In search of Wholeness – a Christian Perspective"**

The studies begin with a focus on personal wholeness of body, mind and spirit. This is then extended to the influences of living in society, with what affects our life as a Christian. The author then considers our living in God's creation, and some of the current world issues such as availability of water, and of stewardship of creation. Dr Wellock brings a Biblical perspective and offers suggestions for prayer. This aspect of the book is towards fulfillment of OSL being 'dedicated to.....healing of situations, of nations, and of God's creation.' Throughout the Chapters there are insightful questions for personal reflection (or discussion). Then there is a Section on 'steps and strategies' for group discussion. Overall there are 12 Studies, but for the average Chapter Meeting it would likely be more helpful to consider sections as provided for in the 'Personal Reflection' questions. Peter Wellock is Warden-Elect of the Australian OSL and his ministry has included teaching, lecturing and pastoral ministry.

Extract from sermon by Jim Cornish, Healing Service in April

(Received in June from Moya -- Eds)

"Vicar Bob suggested that I say something about my six-week experience in three hospitals, with five operations on my right calf in December and January. I found this same caring message - The nurses and doctors in our hospitals are truly devoted, selfless, concerned, caring and compassionate people living out Christ's command, whether they know it or not. Indeed we in NZ are most fortunate with our hospitals and medical services. I no longer regret having paid taxes for over 60 years!

But the most outstanding fact that I learned - which is the same message that Jesus is advocating in our Gospel -- that those of my fellow patients who purposely avoided thinking of themselves and kept thinking of others - - seemed to cope with pain and suffering far better than those who thought only of themselves.

One Christian doctor put it this way: "Pain is one of the mysteries in the universe - it is greatly aggravated by self-pity and self concern."

This is how Jesus handled the pain of the Cross so heroically. Jesus' sensitive soul was never ensnared by self-pity. A heart occupied with love for others may not be proof against pain, but the love seems to help in moderating it. It became clear to me that selfishness increases pain, while selflessness tends to dissipate it. Jesus was the most selfless person that ever lived. He suffered incredibly - but He never lapsed into self-pity. The strength of Christ's Spirit, His dedication to the task His Father had given Him and the sheer selflessness of His very being - enabled Him to rise above the barrier of pain. The message is clear... Self-pity and self-realisation are not part of Christ's teaching - we have to deny ourselves to follow Jesus. Pain and suffering and agony, if it has God behind it, can be turned into triumphant victory. Jesus went through ultimate agony and had the ultimate triumph"
